Randy Deutsch is an architect, educator, author and international keynote speaker. He is a licensed architect who has designed more than 100 large, complex sustainable projects for which he received the AIA Young Architect Award Chicago. Since 2011 Deutsch has authored six books, including "Convergence: The Redesign of Design" (AD, 2017); "Superusers: Design Technology Specialists and the Future of Practice" (Routledge, 2019), "Think Like An Architect: How to develop critical, creative and collaborative problem-solving skills" (RIBA, 2020) and "Adapt As an Article: A Career Companion" (RIBA, 2021).

He began teaching at the University of Illinois at Chicago in 2001. In 2012, he started teaching at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, where until 2019 he was Associate Director for Graduate Studies in the School of Architecture. He previously served on AIA Chicago Board as Director and Vice President; on ARCHITECT Magazine's 2018 R+D jury; and led an annual Executive Education program at Harvard GSD. 
VIRGINIA E. MARQUARDT AIA, LEED AP, NCARB
